John Forbes, the veteran of 104 years of age, of whom we gave some account in September last, died at Crieff on Friday the 16th current, wanting only two days to complete his 105th year. He was confined to the house for about a fortnight before his death – but retained full possession of his mental faculties to the last. In the earlier part of his life, he was in comfortable circumstances, but about 40 years ago, he was visited by misfortunes which he could not surmount, and from that period, till he was 95 years of age, he continued to earn his bread by the sweat of his brow. In the rebellion of 1745, he must have followed the banners of Prince Charles to the field of Culloden, had not his father procured a substitute. At a subsequent period he enlisted in the King's troops, and soon afterwards sailed along with the expedition against Belleisle. He used to give a distinct and animated account of the memorable attack on that fortress, and for some years, considered himself the only individual belonging to the expedition who remained to tell the tale. – *Stirling Advertiser*.

He was the senior member of the Court of Aldermen, and bore consequently the venerable title of "Father of the City." In the early part of his life, his habits were deemed so unfavourable to longevity, that an insurance on his life was refused, it is said, by a Board of Directors, all of whom Sir William has survived. The last active part taken by the worthy baronet in the affairs of the house of which he was the head, was during the panic of 1826, when he attended some days in person, and much assisted to restore confidence by a hearty and cordial manner in which he pressed his customers to withdraw their deposits. – *St. James's Chronicle*.
